# A World of Accordions hosts World Accordion Day and Palmer Festival

A World of Accordions celebrated its annual World Accordion Day and Dr. Willard Palmer Festival in Superior, WI on May 6-8, 2022. Featuring concerts, lectures, a festival orchestra, two polka services, and several social events, the festival was hailed a tremendous success, bringing in both live and online audiences.

Featured guests included the Mayor of Superior, Jim Paine, Museum President and curator Helmi Harrington, PhD, Dr. Mike Middleton (both solo and with The Middletones), CIA Ambassador, AAA Board Member and Museum Vice President Kevin Friedrich, Dee Langley (both solo and with the Masked Accordion Ensemble), AAA Board Member Joanna Arnold Darrow, Jazzlynne Skye, John Scaffeo, Mary Kay and Katherine Archuleta, William Popp, Accordion Concertina Music and Friends Accordion Band conducted by Tracey Gibbens, Hostfest Ensemble, and Dr. Craig Funderberg.

Visitors to the World Accordion Day and Palmer Fests were treated to an array of activities showcasing the diversity of the accordion, an introduction to the extensive Alain Papineau collection donation, as well as guided tours of the Museum displaying more than 1,400 instruments tracing the evolution of the accordion from 1829 to today.

Highlights included three proclamations presented by Mayor Paine and a showcase called "Meet the Family," where Kevin Friedrich, assisted by Jane Christison and Chad Walker, introduced attendees to 18 different members of the accordion family found in the Museum exhibits.

Proclamations from the Mayor included World Accordion Day (May 6), Dr. Willard A. Palmer Day (May 7), and Social Music Celebration Day (May 8).

The "Meet the Family" presentation began with Kevin performing the oldest instrument in the Museum holdings, a 193 year old 6-key Flutina and finished with the magnificent 160 Bass Titano Emperor Super V instrument owned by the late Dr. Willard A. Palmer. Other instruments included the Luttbeg double (left and right hand) piano keyboard, a dual right hand button and piano accordion, a pedestal accordion, Flutter accordion, diatonic, Tanzbar mechanical, Fire Tiger, and more.

A World of Accordions volunteer technician Chad Walker kindly lent his expertise to restore many of the instruments to playing order, while Jane Christison provided accompaniment on several of the performances including for the Cello and Bass accordions, bandoneon, and the unique bell accordion.

To conclude the main festival activities, a 20-member accordion orchestra under the direction of Tracey Gibbens presented a concert of popular pieces showcasing original

accordion composers.

For the second year, an additional celebration was held on the Sunday morning featuring two Polka Services, whereby popular Hymns were either adapted to polkastyle performances, or the words from popular hymns were set to popular accordion classics.

#### ATG features 80-member 80th Anniversary Orchestra

The Accordionists and Teachers Guild, International (ATG) will conclude its 4-day festival with a magnificent 80-member orchestra to celebrate its 80th Anniversary Festival. The orchestra will perform six pieces conducted by Joan Cochran Sommers, and AAA Board Member Kevin Friedrich will serve as Concertmaster. The program will include transcriptions of classic repertoire, arrangements of popular music, and original works for accordion.

Conductor Joan C. Sommers was awarded the title of Professor Emerita upon her retirement from the University of Missouri – Kansas City Conservatory of Music, where she established and taught the accordion degree program for 40 years. She has arranged innumerable works for both accordion orchestra and chamber ensemble over many years, works that have been performed around the globe. She has held numerous positions in several music organizations, including the ATG and the Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (CIA – IMC-UNESCO), where she was recently awarded lifetime Honorary Membership.

Rita Barnea recently presented two virtual concert/lectures in celebration of the 100th birthday of the late Eugene Ettore. On April 27, Rita presented "The Music and Life of Eugene Ettore," organized by Shirley Johnson and Laura Niland for the 2022 Not Just Oompah Workshop and Concert Series. On May 17, Joe Natoli, founder and president of the We Love Accordion group, sponsored the free virtual concert that featured Rita discussing the music and life of Eugene Ettore, along with her performance of many of his virtuoso compositions. Rita is looking forward to more presentations of live or virtual concerts of the music of Eugene Ettore.

At the age of 4, Rita filled glasses of water to create a musical scale and tapped out little songs with a spoon! Her parents took her to Major Music in Irvington, NJ, where Eugene Ettore became her accordion teacher at the age of 9.

From the very first minute, Rita loved the first little red accordion that was given to her, and to this day, not a day goes by that she isn't either playing, listening to, or writing about the accordion.

After years of instruction and playing in bands, she performed in many venues with the Sano Symphony, conducted by Eugene Ettore. Rita also studied the piano and the viola. Auditioning on the accordion for the University of Connecticut Music Department, she was also a Music Education Major. For over 30 years, she taught Pre-K to Grade 5 vocal and special education music in the West Orange, NJ Public Schools, using the accordion to accompany her students. On beautiful, warm days, she took her classes and accordion outside to teach lessons.

Rita has served as the National News Editor and coordinator of www.accordionusa.com for over 14 years. This popular news site covers accordion events, artists, concerts, etc. taking place in North America. Rita enjoys presenting workshops and concerts on the "Life and Music of Eugene Ettore," "The Use of the Accordion in the Teaching of Music in School," and "How to Organize a Children's Birthday Party," centered around the use of the accordion. She has performed in recitals, concerts, workshops, and at accordion festivals throughout the country.

Eugene Ettore began to study the accordion at age 5 with his father, Antonio, a vaudeville accordionist. Truly a renaissance man with varied interests, Eugene always excelled in any subject that he devoted himself to. He specialized

in accordion compositions and arranging music for concert solo and ensemble accordion groups, organ, and guitar (pop and standard tunes.) Mr. Ettore has to his credit over 300 published and unpublished copyrighted works of all genres. He was the author of method books for the accordion, French horn, recorder, and melodica, and the Chief Editor and Arranger for Pietro Deiro Publications from 1955 to 1965.

Eugene served as both President and Vice President of the American Accordionists' Association (AAA), where he was awarded "Outstanding Composer and Arranger." He also served as Vice President of the Accordion Teachers Association of New Jersey. He was the recipient of ASCAP Standard Pane Awards for 1964 and 1965, and listed in 1955's "Who's Who in the East."

#### **Spotlight on AAA Member Brandy DePhillip**

Joan Grauman recounts that she met AAA member Brandy DePhillip at the 2018 AAA Festival in Alexandria, VA. Now living in Maryland and recently playing her accordion again after a several year hiatus, Brandy saw the ads for the festival on Facebook and she and her husband decided to join us. It was terrific having her there! Brandy returned to the AAA Festival in 2019 and won the top award in the Adult Pop competition. Since that time, Brandy's music has taken her to many wonderful places, she now studies accordion online with Joe Natoli, and she regularly performs in the Maryland area.

Brandy says: "I started playing accordion at age 10, also playing the violin starting at age 6. I studied accordion in an accordion studio in Orange County, CA for seven years. I was raised on classical and gospel music. Once I became an adult, I started playing solos and in bands: Country Western and 50s-70s pop music."

As has happened with many accordions, Brandy's instrument ended up in the closet for decades so she could "live a normal life." That life did not suit her and, as she describes so well, "Music has returned to my life and I am loving it. This is my 'normal' now."

Brandy currently plays a Roland FR-8x and 4x. "I love the different sounds that I can create with these 'virtual' accordions!" She enjoys learning and relearning about the accordion from Joe Natoli, who also helps her learn the ins and outs of the Roland V-Accordion. A very enthusiastic musician, Brandy is spreading this joy in her southern Maryland area "where children have no idea what an accordion is and the older crowd has forgotten about the accordion and the beautiful music it produces."

Brandy will perform at several private parties and senior centers in Maryland throughout the summer. If you are in the Annapolis area on June 26, you can hear her perform beautiful the Annmarie Sculpture Garden & Arts Center in Solomons, MD. This special event celebrates the Calvert Library's Summer Splash. She will be the opening for Grammy nominated musician, author, and educator, Pierce Freelon's performances.



#### Meet New AAA Secretary Rita Barnea

At the May 10 AAA Board meeting, Rita Davidson Barnea was appointed the new Secretary of the AAA. Rita has served as a member of the AAA Board for many years.

For over 14 years, Rita has served as the National Editor of www.accordionusa.com Accordion USA News, she presents workshops and concerts on the "Life and Music of Eugene Ettore," "The Use of the Accordion in the Teaching of Music in School," and "How to Organize a Children's Birthday Party," centered around the use of the accordion, and performs recitals at accordion festivals throughout the USA.

Rita retired from a 30-year career as a public school music teacher in West Orange, NJ, where she used her accordion every day in the classroom, taking advantage of its portability to conduct classes in the cafeteria, outdoors, and on the building's upper floors. Her red accordion, covered in stickers, was loved by her students, who all wanted to carry it for her from class to class!

Rita continues to be involved in interesting accordion activities. She had the opportunity to perform with the New Jersey Intergenerational Orchestra at the United Nations several years ago in New York City, where she premiered New Zealand composer, Gary Daverne's "Concert Waltz for Accordion and Strings." She also performed Eugene Ettore's "Manhattan Concerto" with two symphony orchestras. Rita said, "I feel very honored that I was given the opportunity to perform his concerto

with an orchestra. I have always felt that his music is orchestral in nature, not only bringing out the unique characteristics of the accordion, but also demonstrating that his compositions definitely lend themselves to orchestral arrangements, which is something that I would like to see happen in the future."

Rita recounts that Eugene Ettore was one of the first proponents of the "Power of Positive Thinking" with his students. While preparing for competitions or concerts, he would teach techniques of relaxation and focus by using several powerful statements before performances, such as:

- I play with confidence, determination, and accuracy.
- I recollect easily and at will. (This statement also applied to taking tests in school.)

Rita found these statements/mantras to be extremely helpful in reducing anxiety and assisting in total focus on learning and performance, and she uses them even today.

Rita, as National Editor of the Accordion USA News for almost 15 years, has produced over 175 issues of www.accordionusa.com, including over 5,250 articles, achieving over 12 million page views during her tenure as editor.

#### **Washington Metropolitan Accordion Society (WMAS)**

The Washington Metropolitan Accordion Society (WMAS) is still going strong as it enters its 20th year! WMAS was created by three women: Karen Malan-Uribe, Mara Cherkasky, and Anne Johnson. Their first meeting was held on February 11, 2003. The timing was just right as interest in the accordion was on the rise all over the country. Their mission has always been "to bring together accordionists and promote accordion music in the National Capital region." That first meeting, which was promoted in several newspapers in and around Washington, DC, brought 25 enthusiastic attendees, many whom decided to take their accordions "out of the closets" after decades for this new club. Most never left.

In late 2003, Joan Grauman (AAA Board Member and Historian) was recruited by the club. Within months, she became the Music Director, a position she held until leaving the Washington, DC area in 2019. She founded the Potomac Accordion Ensemble, a small group of accordionists from WMAS in the fall of 2004. Joan directed this group, which performed in several AAA festivals as well as several American Accordion Musicological Society (AAMS) banquets for over a decade. She was also the conductor of the WMAS Holiday Orchestra (2004-2018) in the annual festive holiday concert and potluck dinner. This event has consistently brought close to 140 attendees each year.

In the fall of 2004, WMAS created its "Guest Artist Series," which brings in guests accordionists in the spring and fall each year. The guests are well-known musicians from outside the DC area, who present programs for the club during its Sunday meetings. This has been a huge success from the start! Rita Davidson was the first

"official" guest artist. Their impressive roster of artists over the years has included Grayson Masefield, Stas Venglevski, Frank Petrilli, Dallas Vietty, Beverly Roberts Curnow, Mary Tokarski, Gail Campanella, Dominic Karcic, Ray Oreggia, The Busso Trio, and Joe Natoli, just to name a few. Special guests from the DC area have included Rose-Marie Coppola and Lou Coppola.

In the spring of 2019, Joan turned over the job of Music Director to Peter DiGiovanni. In Joan's words, "Peter is doing a fantastic job - incredible, really!" Peter took the club through the pandemic with well-organized virtual meetings and a delightful virtual holiday concert.

Additionally, he has conducted two inperson holiday concerts, which included several of his excellent compositions and arrangements.

WMAS was pleased to hold an in-person Member Concert on June 19. Their first in-person Member Concert since 2019, WMAS members were invited to play a selection of their own choice for the audience. Upcoming WMAS concerts include bandoneon artist Emmanuel Trifilio on July 17, and another appearance by Stas Venglevski on September 25. Both concerts will be at 4:00pm at Sleepy Hollow United Methodist Church in Falls Church, VA.

#### Canadian Premiere of Sofia Gubaidulina's Fachwerk

Canadian artist Michael Bridge gave the Canadian premiere of Sofia Gubaidulina's magnificent accordion concerto, Fachwerk, with Esprit Orchestra in Toronto's iconic Koerner Hall on June 9.

Soloist Michael recounts: "I believe Fachwerk (2009) is among the best and most exciting works that exist accordion today. The for scored concerto is for accordion soloist, string orchestra, and percussion. It has been performed hundreds of times around the world, but not yet in Canada.

Preparing this concerto became a deep personal passion. In September 2021, I traveled to Iceland to hear Geir Draugsvoll (for whom it was written) rehearse and perform the concerto with the Iceland Symphony. He was very generous; we had all our meals together that week, and

he shared the story of Fachwerk with me, including his 30 -year history with the composer, the evolution of the cadenzas, and his experiences performing it – now over 50 times."

Sofia Gubaidulina, one of the world's foremost living composers, has written 14 works for accordion from solo sonatas to concerti. She was born in the Tatar Republic of the USSR, and has resided in Hamburg, Germany since

1992. Her music is deeply linked to her spirituality and, in the case of Fachwerk, the structure of the accordion itself.

Fachwerk literally means "Wooden Scaffolding" and refers to a style of German architecture where the structural wooden beams are exposed and the joints are visible, forming crosses. The modern concert accordion has several button layouts on one instrument; Gubaidulina's idea was for the accordionist to play the same button sequence with both hands, but on different button systems so that the mirrored actions produce different tones. Gubaidulina then found an ingenious way to

turn this concept into a beautiful cadenza, by locating starting points for each hand that, when layered, sound haunting, austere, and sublime. Hence, she recounts, "The

accordion itself wrote the cadenza," from which the entire concerto blossomed.

Bridge's Michael performance with the **Esprit** Orchestra, Canada's only orchestra dedicated to performing and promoting new music, under the direction of Alex Pauk, also featured a pre-concert talk at The Roval Conservatory Music in Toronto. Ontario.





# Pioneer Women of the AAA - Alice "Essie" Bradshaw Armstrong considered the "Sweetheart of the Accordion" in the early years of the AAA

It is my pleasure to have the opportunity to write about this incredible woman who spent her entire life playing, selling, teaching, and promoting the accordion. The most incredible thing is that, although Essie was very much involved when the AAA was founded in 1938, and worked closely with many of the founders of the AAA, we really did not know of her existence - until recently. I am ever so grateful for Essie's daughter Kathy Marcus' persistence in locating me, telling me all about her mother, and sending me so many delightful and insightful papers and photos about her mother's early years in the New York area accordion world.

Alice "Essie" Bradshaw was born in Chinook, MT in 1917. The family moved to Spokane, WA a few years later. Essie began studying the piano and piano accordion as a young child in Spokane. After graduating from high school in 1935, she became well-known in Spokane as an accordion soloist, playing at many prestigious social events.

In 1936, Essie flew to New York City to study at Juilliard School of Music. She quickly became an accordionist on the National Broadcasting Company (NBC radio) staff, and she worked at the H. Selmer and Excelsior Accordion Company. Soon, after meeting Joe Biviano at the radio station, Essie became an accordion instructor at the Joe Biviano School of Music on West 48th Street in New York City. Joe and his then-

partner Gene von Hallberg made Essie the school's Assistant Director.

In the 1930s, women were not usually placed in the foreground in the world of the popular new instrument: the accordion. While you may never find old radio photos featuring Essie, which is surprising as she was a very beautiful young woman, Essie was very respected and loved by her colleagues. I now have a collection of wonderful promotional photos of the well-known accordionists who wrote to Essie on their photos. Johnny Serry referred to Essie as "Sweet Stuff." Joe Biviano wrote, "...our most capable and charming assistant." The excellent duo of brothers Anthony and Dominic Mecca wrote, "...our dear friend and 'Sweetheart of the Accordion." Brothers John and Charles Magnante each wrote: "The First Lady of the Accordion" (John), and "to a FINE accordionist and great teacher!" (Charles). The first meeting of the AAA was held on March 9, 1938. At the second meeting, held on

April 9, 1938, Essie was presented with the second Certificate of Membership in the AAA (see photograph of this certificate). It was signed by two of the founders, Sam Rowland and the first AAA President, Pietro Deiro, Sr.

In 1940, Essie performed at Carnegie Chamber Music Hall at the Joe Biviano School of Music's student recital. Charles Magnante arranged the G Minor Fugue, by JS Bach, for four accordions so the four teachers could perform together: Joe Biviano, Gene von Hallberg, Alice "Essie" Bradshaw, and John Magnante. Essie continued to teach at the Biviano studio until 1943 when she married and returned to Spokane, WA.

Upon her return to Spokane, Essie went back to her name Alice. Alice Bradshaw Armstrong never stopped playing or teaching music. In her later years, after retiring from the Hoffman Music Company in Spokane, Alice and her husband, John B. Armstrong moved to South Hill, WA, where she became involved in a choir. This choir, a traveling ministry, performed in every state and made several trips to Europe. Alice "Essie" played her accordion all over the world with this choir. She was also a member of the Spokane Accordion Ensemble, directed by Ilmar Kuljus, during the 1990s.

Sadly, Alice developed Alzheimer's and eventually had no memories of the beautiful life she had led. "She taught my brother and me to be strong and caring people," her proud daughter Kathy said. Alice "Essie" Bradshaw Armstrong died at the age of 100 1/2 in 2018.





#### **Accordions in the Heart of New York City**

Attendees may bring their own food or purchase from on-site food and beverage vendors near the Lawn. COVID-19 vaccinations and masks are not currently required, but Bryant Park will continue to monitor and follow updated New York City and New York State COVID-19 guidelines throughout the summer.

Dr. William Schimmel's Accordion Seminars will be held July 29-31, 2022. Celebrating its 28th year, as in the previous two years, the event will held virtually.
